Ultra TCS awarded IDIQ contract for Battlespace IT systems for US DoD

Ultra TCS, the premier global supplier of High Capacity Line-of-Sight (HCLOSTM) radio communication systems, announced that it has been awarded an Indefinite Delivery, Indefinite Quantity (IDIQ) contract over seven years, valued at \$31M.

Ultra Electronics Canada Defence Inc. Tactical Communication Systems Division ("Ultra TCS") announced the awards made by the Canadian Commercial Corporation acting on behalf of the US Department of Defence for the AN/GRC-245A HCLOS™ radio communication system, a key element of the US Army's WIN-T Program. The initial contract authorization under the IDIQ contract is valued at about \$31M (US) for the purchase of HCLOS™ radios, spares, and support to be delivered in the first half of 2011.

This seven year engagement validates the performance of Ultra TCS' HCLOS[™] radios used in the US Army's WIN-T program. These radios will be used to support continued deployment to US military units. Ultra TCS has delivered thousands of HCLOS[™] radios to the US Army, US Marine Corps and FMS Programs to support combat operations in theaters around the world.

The AN/GRC-245 HCLOS[™] radio communication system is a state-of-the-art Software Defined Radio (SDR) and is using the Software Communications Architecture (SCA) open framework.

"We are pleased that our HCLOS[™] radio continues to satisfy the American military's demanding performance requirements and that we are able to continue our long relationship as a valuable supplier of communication systems to the U.S." states Iwan Jemczyk, president of Ultra TCS. "Many U.S. military units currently deployed in combat zones around the world rely on our HCLOS communications systems to provide the backbone communications between command posts. This award acknowledges Ultra TCS' dedication over the years towards innovation and the ongoing commitment of our people to support the US military, today and in the future, in providing their soldiers the tactical radio communications systems they require to safely complete their missions."

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
